SECTION 3: Notice of the regular meeting of the membership shall be given by the Secretary in writing to the members entitled to vote by sending a copy of the notice through the mail, charges prepaid, to the address of each member as the same appears on the records of the Corporation, or as supplied by a member for the purpose of notice or by electronic transmission by the Corporation in accordance with the provisions of Section 20 of the California Corporations Code, not less than 30 days before such meeting. The notice shall include the following information:

- A. The date, time and place of the meeting.
- B. The names of proposed new members and names of members being proposed for elevation to the class of Full Member or Life Member.
- C. The agenda of the meeting specifying any items of business to be conducted which will require a vote of the general membership of the Corporation.

SECTION 7: Quorum.

- A. A quorum at any regular meeting of the membership shall be equal to the number of members present.

• Website Re-Design

- MH1 Studios was contacted to design a new web layout for the NWAFS after approval at the 2013 meeting in Vancouver. I met with the graphics designer and the person that would do the coding for the website to go over what we wanted. We were quoted a rate of \$2,250 for a complete re-design. A down payment of \$1,000 was issued to the company in April 2014 and they began building a test website.



The ABC exam is populated by questions based on the Knowledge, Skills and Abilities (KSA's) and Frequency and Importance (F&I), which is a weighting factor.

KSA's are created after job descriptions; these KSA's define the study guides.

Exam Committee members evaluated the KSA 1-9 general knowledge questions for difficulty using a 0-3 scale. The concept is that by each question having a rating, equivalent questions can be swapped in and out of exams but maintain the difficulty level.

After individually rating the questions, committee members continue to work on generating a composite score for each question.

Database Manager

Dave Stockwell will become the paid database manager. The specific position related tasks will be in the contract; he gave a proposal that included reporting structure and security of database.

Forms

A form was developed to be used as the ABC Proctor Security Agreement, and the instruction form for HOSTING AND OFFERING CERTIFICATION EXAMINATIONS FOR THE AMERICAN BOARD OF CRIMINALISTICS was updated.

Additionally, a Request for Proposal is being developed for the sensitivity and bias evaluation of some 600 possible new exam questions.

ABC Report by Chris Hamburg

My specific duties this year have revolved mostly around meeting planning. I work directly with HelmsBrisco to secure meeting sites. Erica and I have been working on a marketing pamphlet to use as handouts at regional forensic meetings. I am also involved in compiling a training spreadsheet for our recertification committee to use as a reference when awarding points.

ABC Overview

The ABC is composed of regional and national organizations which represent forensic scientists. Each organization is entitled to one member on the ABC Board of Directors and one member on the ABC Examination Committee. Additionally, there are three At-Large Director positions and one public member.

The ABC currently offers certification in the following areas: Drug Analysis, Fire Debris Analysis, Molecular Biology, Comprehensive Criminalistics, Hairs and Fibers, and Paints and Polymers. There are currently 1025 certified individuals. From January-July 2014 there were 85 tests administered with more to come later in the year.

The ABC is looking to expand to other sub-disciplines. Explosives may be one of these areas if enough interest is generated.

ABC Updates

The ABC has been re-accredited by the FSAB (Forensic Specialties Accreditation Board) for another 5 years. The ABC is currently in the process of moving toward accreditation by the ISO 17024 standard. To this end, the ABC has purchased a web-based document control system and is looking to hire a Quality Assurance Manager as an independent contractor. There is no projected time frame at this point for ISO accreditation.

The AAFS Director spot is open; if you are a member of the Criminalistics Section of the AAFS and are interested in being their representative to the ABC please contact the Criminalistics chair, Larry Quarino.

Recertification Points

Please use the recertification form for the current year that is available on the ABC website, www.criminalistics.com. After ISO accreditation old forms cannot be accepted.

The ABC will now grant 5 points for a graduate thesis review that is related to forensic science. A copy of the sign-off page is required for documentation.

Fellows need to use the new form ABC701 for Proficiency Test submissions.

For those that passed a certification test initially and were granted Diplomate status, if you are now taking proficiency tests in those subject matters you may be eligible for advancement to Fellow status. Submit an application and a \$50 review fee.

Scholarship

Please submit for the Ed Rhodes Scholarship. The NWAFS can select one person each year to sit for testing for free. The person may also be retroactively reimbursed if the NWAFS selects them after they have already paid.

Meeting Costs

Until the Portland meeting, some Directors were spending their own money to attend the meetings because some groups (AAFS, ASTM, ASCLD) did not reimburse beyond the stipend which has been continuously raised over the past year. Thank you NWAFS for not being included in this group! Since I was local to the Portland meeting, the NWAFS did not incur any cost for my attendance because the actual expenses were less than the stipend. My meeting costs for Seattle were \$84.06 after the \$800 stipend was applied. The ABC is striving to take all financial responsibility for meeting costs away from member organizations. Hopefully in the future, the Member Organization year dues (\$500) will also be eliminated.

We will be meeting again at the AAFS meeting in Orlando in February, 2015. The test offerings will be Wednesday of that week.




